In that film, the English actor Frederick Treves, Sir Frederick's great-nephew, plays an alderman. Working at the London Hospital and coming into contact with criminal cases, he is also depicted by Paul Ready in the BBC historical crime drama *Ripper Street*, set in the East End in the 1890s. A fictional version of *The Tale of a Field Hospital* and Treves are featured in an episode of horror fiction podcast *The Magnus Archives* by Jonathon Sims.
