Governor Michael V. DiSalle put his political career on the line to save Edythe from the death penalty, personally interviewing the prisoner while she was under the influence of "truth serum." Harriette Arnow ' s search for truth as early American settlers knew it

began as a child—the old songs, handed-down stories, and proverbs that colored her world compelled her on a journey that informs her depiction of the Cumberland River Valley in Kentucky and Tennessee. Arnow drew from court records, wills, inventories, early newspapers, and unpublished manuscripts to write *Seedtime on the Cumberland*, which chronicles the movement of settlers away from the coast, as well as their continual refinement of the “art of pioneering.” A companion piece, this evocative history covers the same era, 1780 – 1803, from the first settlement in what was known as “Middle Tennessee” to the Louisiana Purchase. When Middle Tennessee was the American frontier, the men and women who settled there struggled for survival, land, and human dignity. The society they built in their new home reflected these accomplishments, vulnerabilities, and ambitions, at a time when America was experiencing great political, industrial, and social upheaval.

Leah Marcus was the seventeen-year-old daughter of a rich, white, Jewish power couple, the father a famous mass tort lawyer, the mother CEO of a non-profit corporation assisting the mentally ill. Leah was a prodigy piano player who dreamed of becoming a pediatric neurosurgeon. Leah's boyfriend, Damon Allbright, was the star point guard at their high

school, an excellent student, gifted with an angelic singing voice and the African American son of the pastor at one of Cincinnati's major Baptist churches. During the fourth day of Cincinnati's 2001 race riots, someone bludgeoned, bound, strangled and probably sexually assaulted Leah. Leah Marcus' death held the city spellbound during the spring and summer of 2001. Suspicion soon fell on Leah's boyfriend. After Damon's DNA is found in Leah's body, the investigators charged him with her rape and murder. Her murder, the alleged murder, of a beautiful, young white woman at the hands of a black man, gripped the city like so many crimes involving sex, race and class. Damon was tried for the offense. Ten years later, the crime reporter for the Cincinnati Tribune, who covered the crime and trial, decides to re-investigate the murder and learn the truth behind the senseless killing. Her story is a tragedy in the tradition of Shakespeare. And *The River Runs Deep* drills into the lives of two families set amidst the turbulent times of racial strife and the impending doom of 9/11.
