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Due diligence will then usually have two phases: (1) A request is made for certain written documents, which the buyer then reviews and (2) the buyer conducts on-site verification possibly using interviews of company personnel. There are three parts to due diligence: (1) Legal (2) Financial, and (3) Operational. I ' ll cover what goes into each of them in future posts. 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What is this thing called. due diligence? Due diligence is a process during which a potential buyer of a company investigates that company to gain information to allow it to decide whether to go through with the acquisition. Due Diligence is the act of gathering and evaluating information about a target business.
