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Teaching Nonfiction Paragraph Structure Using The ...

Nonfiction Passages and Functional Texts Students need to gain lots of practice working with nonfiction passages. This prepares them for more advanced course work. Here are some nonfiction reading passages, worksheets, and online practice activities to give students practice.

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Students are given the first and last paragraphs from pieces of non-fiction writing. The tasks take the form of articles, speeches, letters, advice and discussions. They could either write the missing middle section or write a brief plan for the missing paragraphs.

Writers organize their writing into parts, chapters, sections, and then into paragraphs. Paragraphs long ago became a standard device for organizing the ideas in a book or the flow of a story. When the writer creates a paragraph, it breaks the flow of text and sends an important signal to the reader.
