In this erudite text, Professor Ong applies a forensic knowledge of the relevant case law, across Australian and international

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jurisdictions, resulting in a comprehensive analysis of Specific Performance. Denis Ong is a Professor of Law at Bond University.

This book deals with the contractual platform for arbitration and the application of contractual

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norms to the parties' dispute. Arbitration and agreement are inter-linked in three respects: (i) the agreement to arbitrate is itself a contract; (ii) there is scope (subject to clear consensual exclusion) in England for monitoring the arbitral tribunal's

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fidelity and accuracy in applying substantive English contract law; (iii) the subject-matter of the arbitration is nearly always a ‘ contractual ’ matter. These three elements underlie this work. They appear as Part I (arbitration is founded on agreement), Part II

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(monitoring accuracy), Part III (synopsis of the English contractual rules frequently encountered within arbitration). The book will be a useful resource to foreign lawyers or English non-lawyers, English lawyers seeking a succinct discussion, and to arbitral

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tribunals.

Studies in the Contract Laws of Asia provides an authoritative account of the contract law regimes of selected Asian jurisdictions, including the major centres of commerce where limited critical commentaries have

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been published in the English language. Each volume in the series aims to offer an insider's perspective into specific areas of contract law - remedies, formation, parties, contents, vitiating factors, change of circumstances, illegality, and public policy - and explores

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how these diverse jurisdictions address common problems encountered in contractual disputes. A concluding chapter draws out the convergences and divergences, and other themes. All the Asian jurisdictions examined have inherited or adopted the

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common law or civil law models of European legal systems. Scholars of legal transplant will find a mine of information on how received law has developed after the initial adaptation and transplant process, including the mechanisms of and influences affecting these

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developments. At the same time, many points of convergence emerge. These provide good starting points for regional harmonization projects. Volume IV of Studies in the Contract Laws of Asia deals with factors affecting the validity of contracts (mistake,

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fraud, misrepresentation, coercion, and unfair exploitation) in the laws of China, Hong Kong, India, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Myanmar, the Philippines, Singapore, Taiwan, Thailand, and Vietnam. Typically, each jurisdiction is covered in two

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chapters; the first deals with erroneous beliefs, while the second deals with reprehensible conduct of one of the contracting parties.

The objectives of this study are to describe experiences in price setting and how pricing has been used to attain better coverage,

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strategies for access without reinforcing marginalisation and exclusion. We can't not want access for ourselves or for others. However, we are then in danger of remaining immersed in a distribution of power that

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reinforces and naturalises inequality as difference. For applied theatre and drama education, the act of creating, teaching, and learning is intrinsically connected to choice, along with the agency and

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capacity to choose. What is less clear, and what still interests us, is how the distribution of power and representation creates the schema for an analysis of access and diversity. This book was originally published as a special

"Rhetoric, broadly
conceived as the art of
making things matter, is

of rhetoric have turned to

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practical art, they mean methods tested in practice, by trial and error, with a goal of offering something useful and teachable. This volume presents just such an

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account of rhetoric. The account here does not turn away from theory, but rather presumes and incorporates theoretical approaches, offering a collection of principles

assembled in the heat and trials of public practice. The approaches ventured in this volume are inspired by the capacious conception of rhetoric put forth by historian of

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rhetoric Jeffrey Walker,
who is perhaps best known
for stressing rhetoric's
educational mission and
its contributions to civic
life. The Practice of
Rhetoric is organized into

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three sections designed to spotlight, in turn, the importance of poetics, performance, and philosophy in rhetorical practice. The volume begins with poetics,

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stressing the world-making properties of that word, in contexts ranging from mouse-infested medieval fields to the threat of toxin-ridden streams in the mid-twentieth century.

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Susan C. Jarratt, for instance, probes the art of ekphrasis, or vivid description, and its capacity for rendering alternative futures. Michele Kennerly explores

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a little-studied
linguistic predecessor to
prose-logos psilos, or
naked speech-exposing the
early rumblings of a
separation between poetic
and rhetorical texts even

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as it historicizes the idea of clothed or ornamented speech. In an essay on the almost magical properties of writing, Debra Hawhee considers the curious

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practice of people writing letters to animals in order to banish or punish them, thereby casting the epistolary arts in a new light. Part 2 moves to performance. Vessela

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Valiavitcharska examines the intertwining of poetic rhythm and performance in Byzantine rhetorical education, and how such practices underlie the very foundations of

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oratory. Dale Martin Smith draws on the ancient stylistic theory of Dionysius of Halicarnassus along with the activist work of contemporary poets Amiri Baraka and Harmony

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Holiday to show how
performance and persuasion
unify rhetoric and
poetics. Most treatments
of philosophy and rhetoric
begin within a
philosophical framework,

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and remain there, focusing on old tools like stasis and disputation. Essays in part 3 break out of that mold by focusing on the utility and teachability of rhetorical principles

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in education. Jeanne Fahnestock and Marie Secor update stasis, a classical framework that encourages aspiring rhetors to ask after the nature of things, their facts and

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their qualities, as a way of locating an argument's position. Mark Garrett Longaker probes the medieval practice of disputation in order to marshal a new argument

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about why, exactly, John
Locke detested rhetoric,
and the longstanding
opposition between science
and rhetoric as modes of
proof that has lasting
implications for the way

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argument works today.
Ranging across centuries
and contexts, the essays
collected here demonstrate
the continued need to
attend carefully to the co-
operation of descriptive

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language and normative
reality, conceptual
vocabulary and material
practice, public speech
and moral self-shaping.
The volume promises to
rekindle long-standing

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conversations about the
public, world-making
practice of rhetoric,
thereby enlivening anew

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The Varieties of Restitution

This book is the product of a unique collaboration between Mainland Chinese scholars and scholars from the civil, common, and mixed jurisdiction legal traditions. It begins by placing the current Chinese contract law (CCL) in the context

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of an evolutionary process accelerated during China's transition to a market economy. It is structured around the core areas of contract law, anticipatory repudiation (common law) and defense of security (German law); and remedies and damages, with a focus on the availability of specific performance in Chinese law. The

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book also offers a useful comparison between the CCL and the UNIDROIT Principles of International Commercial Contracts, as well as the Convention on Contracts for the International Sale of Goods. The analysis in the book is undertaken at two levels - practical application of the CCL and scholarly

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commentary.

Over the past decade, the High Court has repeatedly rejected the notion that there is a unifying principle of unjust enrichment at the plaintiff's expense, in contrast to the position in the UK. This book provides a vigorous and sustained

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justification for the Australian position, and demonstrates that the law in the UK has generated more fictions than it was ever thought to abolish. The law of restitution is shown to comprise several fundamentally distinct legal concepts which fill gaps in the law of contract and

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tort, and which have nothing in common beyond the historical accident that they arose out of the action of indebitatus assumpsit. These are (i) the recovery of non-voluntary payments (by mistake, duress, undue influence, unconscionable dealing and total failure

of consideration); (ii) remuneration for goods or services requested by the defendant in circumstances indicating a promise to pay for them; and (iii) the protection of certain facilitative institutions of private law (such as private property and fiduciary relationships).

The book staunchly defends the traditional common law approach of analysing legal principles by the empirical method of treating like cases alike, rather than by derivation from supposedly unifying theories. This edition updates the first edition, which

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was published in 1998, in the light of almost 20 years of case-law and academic debate. It also adds a separate chapter dealing with the history of the law of restitution and why it matters.

In this book Professor Denis Ong, author of the acclaimed works *Trusts*

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Law, Ong on Equity and Ong on Specific Performance, addresses the complexities of the equitable doctrine of Subrogation. This lucid text ranges over all areas where the doctrine is most commonly applied â e" insurance, trusts and the administration of estates, and sureties.

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Generally, the key principles of law are identified and the key cases, across Australian and international jurisdictions, discussed in detail. In *Ong on Rectification*, Professor Denis SK Ong brings his customary penetrating analysis of the authorities to the equitable

remedy of rectification. Topics discussed include: the nature of rectification; a detailed exploration of the principles of contractual construction; the difference between construction and rectification; rectification of both common and unilateral mistakes; and rectification of

wills. Professor Ong very carefully sets out both the Australian and English authorities, highlighting the differences between them as well as remaining "grey" or unresolved areas. His analysis of the High Court decisions on construction, following the House of Lords decision in

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Chartbrook Ltd, is particularly illuminating in this regard. He quotes extensively, though judiciously, from the cases and is unafraid to point out problems he perceives in the reasoning contained therein. As such this book will be an invaluable resource for all those

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involved in contractual construction, disputes and adjudication. The book is Professor Ong's seventh major book in the field of equity and is the perfect supplement to his earlier works which now include: *Trusts Law in Australia* (now in its 4th edition); *Ong on Equity*;
