

The On The Cliff

Five years ago, Don Snyder was teaching English at Colgate University. He was forty years old and had a wife, three children, a new baby on the way, and what seemed like a secure middle-class future. But then Snyder lost his chance at tenure -- and, all of a sudden, he was out of a job. *The Cliff Walk* is a moving, clear-eyed account of Snyder's agonizing loss and what it feels like to fall, rung by rung, down the socio-economic ladder. Snyder chronicles the denial and disbelief he went through as his hopes of finding another teaching job faded after being rejected for ninety positions. He explains how each painful change -- selling his house, buying groceries with food stamps -- reminded him how much he and his family had taken for granted in their previous life. And he describes how he finally found new hope in a job on a home construction crew in Maine. Working outside for ten hours a day through a vicious winter taught Snyder about his own cowardice and the lies he had come to believe about what a professional life of hard work entitled him to. Written with precision and elegance, *The Cliff Walk* captures the depth of one family's love and speaks to anyone who has ever wondered what it would be like to be out of a job and out in the cold. *The Leopard and the Cliff* has been out of print for a long time with second-hand copies being elusive; nonetheless it has a grim resonance with today demonstrating the futility of fighting in that part of the world. The book represents a vivid and realistic portrayal of capitalism and social climbers in Chicago, with the strong emphasis on the city itself, which is presented as a force that breaks down anyone who isn't ready to play by its merciless rules.

“ You ’ ve always been crazy, ” says Louise to Thelma, shortly after she locks a police officer in the trunk of his car.

The designer of *Unreal* and *Gears of War* offers an eye-opening personal account of the video game industry as it grew from niche hobby to hundred-billion-dollar enterprise. Video games are dominating the planet. In 2020, they brought in \$180 billion dollars globally—nearly \$34 billion in the United States alone. So who are the brilliant designers who create these stunning virtual worlds? Cliff Bleszinski—or CliffyB as he is known to gamers—is one of the few who’ve reached mythical, rock star status. He details Epic’s rise to industry leader, thanks largely to his work on bestselling franchises *Unreal* and *Gears of War* (and, later, his input on a little game called *Fortnite*), as well as his own awkward ascent from shy, acne-riddled introvert to sports car-driving celebrity rubbing shoulders with Bill Gates. As he writes, “No one is weirder than a nerd with money.” While the book is laced with such self-deprecating humor, Bleszinski also bluntly addresses the challenges that have long-faced the gaming community, including sexism and a lack of representation among both designers and the characters they create. *Control Freak* is a hilarious, thoughtful, and inspiring memoir. Even if you don’t play games, you’ll walk away from this book recognizing them as a true art form and appreciating

the genius of their creators.

The instinct to distract spreads and has learned to mask itself under the instinct to pleasure, the instinct to self-preservation, the instinct to self-improvement--the list continues, but its favorite mask is the instinct to largeness. The instinct to largeness, to generalization, to lumping-in is humorously disproportionate these days. One now has more means than ever to group and package entire populations of life's stimuli in an impossibly large box: the smallness of individual life is lumped into grand, too grand terms. The smallness of life is made to be something grand, something unreasonably leaping. The small comprising parts of reality all demand to be grouped in with something larger. The stimuli of life, of reality--the bare and small experiences of everyday life--have contracted megalomania and now look at

themselves through the lense of concepts. But how empty these concepts become when you zoom into one single part that comprises them.
